# Giving to non-UK universities by the UK's richest 150 individuals

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# **Key findings**

The scale of giving by the UK's richest residents to non-UK universities points to the increasing internationalisation of university philanthropy.

- Funding by the UK's 150 richest individuals as identified by the *Sunday Times 2019 Rich List* shows that £751m has been given to non-UK universities over the past five years (2014-18).
- 21 percent of the Top 150 Sunday Times Rich List have made 197 donations to 86 non-UK universities in 22 countries over the past five years.
- 59 percent of giving in this study went to universities in the US.
- Giving to non-UK universities has increased dramatically over the past five years.
- In 2014, the UK's 150 richest individuals gave £42m to 22 non-UK universities. In 2018 they gave nearly £292m to 43 non-UK universities.
- The biggest individual donor to non-UK universities in the past five years is the Ukrainian-born billionaire Sir Len Blatvanik who has given £235m.
- Norwegian Trond Mohn has given £160m in the past five years to a number of Norwegian universities, while Anglo Hong-Kong billionaire Samuel Tak-Lee has given nearly £120m to universities.
- Harvard University is the biggest beneficiary (£202m) of giving to a non-UK university, and the recipient of the single biggest donation in this survey.
- Columbia University in New York is the most popular university for giving among the UK's richest. Five individuals have donated over £12m in the past five years.
- The Anglo-Zimbabwean billionaire Alan Parker has given to the widest number of non-UK universities. His foundation has given £23m to 35 universities over the past 5 years, 22 of which are in the US.

## Case study: Sir Len Blavatnik

Sir Len Blavatnik is ranked as the UK's fourth richest individual according to the *Sunday Times 2019 Rich List*. He is also a well known benefactor of universities. In 2010, he donated £75m to Oxford University and in 2013 he gifted \$50m to Harvard University. According to our study, he is the UK's most generous benefactor of non-UK universities between 2014-18. Seven non-UK universities received £235m. This amounts to 31% of all giving to non-UK universities by the UK's 150 richest. The beneficiaries are:

- Stanford University, US
- Columbia University, US
- University of Pennsylvania, US
- University of Southern California, US

### About our research

The purpose of this research was to identify giving to non-UK universities by the UK's wealthiest individuals. Our study drew on the *Sunday Times 2019 Rich List* as a basis for the research. We identified reported giving to universities either by individuals directly or by means of a charitable trust which channels their philanthropy.
